

QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION

1. Why is the hometown crowd the one most difficult to “please?” What can we do to reduce this problem today?
2. Why did the second part of Jesus’ message enrage His hearers? What was the basic wrong in their hearts?
3. Was it presumptuous for Jesus to “announce” himself as the fulfillment of Isaiah’s prophecy? Why not? Does History support Jesus’ position? Discuss.
4. Why cannot Jesus do miracles where there is no faith? Surely nothing is impossible with God. (Mark 6:5)

SUMMARY:

“Familiarity breeds contempt” was never so true as at the synagogue on this Sabbath morning when Jesus had the difficult task of ushering in a new spiritual era for mankind, and in the one place in the world where it would be the hardest to do—His hometown.

But Jesus never faltered, never held back for lack of courage and conviction. His own people needed to hear the good news, but they rejected it and others reaped blessings meant to be theirs. He plainly revealed to them their unbelief, their rejection of His divine calling. As He later told the religious people of Jerusalem the harsh fact that “it cannot be that a prophet perish out of Jerusalem,” so He told the people of His hometown that because of the hardness of their hearts in rejecting Him, they would likewise not realize God’s blessings given to the faithful in this new era of grace.

NOTES:

[SoF:1] We believe that the Bible is inspired by God, and is the complete, infallible Word of God.

[SoF:15] We believe that the Great Commission of our Lord Jesus Christ is an invitation for everyone to live a life of abandonment to Him, Who loved us and gave Himself for us - surrendering His personal ambitions and possessions in an unreserved committal to take the proclamation of the Gospel throughout “all the world to every creature”.

LESSON SETTING: Synagogue in Nazareth

QUARTERLY THEME: Christ the Son of Man

TOPIC: JESUS CALLS FOUR DISCIPLES

INTRODUCTION:

Jesus could have taught in a more sophisticated manner, but he chose not to. Yet he taught as one having power and authority. Sitting down in a fishing boat hardly seems becoming to one who was to teach about the glories of heaven. Yet it was among these people that the gospel message was most readily received.

Although Christ was the Son of God, He was also the Son of man. Although He was from heaven above, He lived a lowly life so that He could see and understand all the needs of people. And so, in turn, people could relate to Him.

A closer look at the teachings of Jesus shows that His authority was in His message. His power was from God and demonstrated in miracles. Living as a humble man, He had the knowledge of what people need, and being from the Father in Heaven, He knows and has the power to fulfill those needs.

CENTRAL TRUTH: The more we learn to trust Jesus, the better followers we will become.

GOLDEN TEXT: AND WHEN THEY HAD BROUGHT THEIR SHIPS TO LAND, THEY FORSOOK ALL, AND FOLLOWED HIM. Luke 5:11

The fantastic experience these fishermen had with Jesus showed them how futile and powerless they were compared to Him. The draught of fishes they caught was only because of their submission and obedience to the Master. So impressed were they by Christ's understanding and help that they were willing to leave all they had to completely follow Christ in a new and different life.

While Christ was on earth, His disciples physically followed Him. Of course, they had to leave their old way of living. Since He is now ascended to heaven, we cannot physically follow Him, but we must follow Him in spirit, and live our lives in this knowledge. This requires that we "forsake all" of our old life to follow Christ and live a new and different one. Most of us cannot leave our jobs, as the fishermen did, but we must leave behind "all that is in the world, the lusts of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life," and walk in the Spirit. (Romans 8:9)
