QUARTERLY THEME: LIFE AND WRITINGS OF PAUL

TOPIC: PAUL MEETS CHRIST

INTRODUCTION:

When Saul started his trip to Damascus, he little realized that this was his final journey as an enemy of God, even though he thought he was doing God a service. God had enough of letting this zealot run rampant over His infant church. All this energy was being wasted toward destruction instead of construction.

The encounter with Jesus was very dramatic and indeed it had to be, in order to drive home to Saul the seriousness of his crime. From a lion into a lamb, Saul's conversion is one of the shortest recorded in scripture.

CENTRAL TRUTH: In mercy, God forgives men and equips them for His service.

GOLDEN TEXT: *LORD, WHAT WILT THOU HAVE ME TO DO?*

Acts 9:6

Since the time of Paul, how many times has this question been repeated? Its full effect in a person's life can, however, only be felt when the emphasis is placed on the personal pronoun "me". Conversion is a personal matter between Jesus and the individual. There are no shortcuts, no substitutes, no salvation by proxy. We either are, or we are not.

And what does the Lord want me to do? To be a chosen vessel, meet for the Master's use.
